
Travel Corridors

Travel corridors are for the most part a well-used deer movement pathway that connects to or more habitat features such as bedding/security areas, food sources, Ag fields and or food plots. These main travel runways can be found in all kinds of habitats from open woodlots to high stem density, thick edges of wetlands ponds & streams. Often typography can dictate choke points that a hunter can capitalize on. However, many landowners starting out creating bedding and food plots can use a bit of creativity to implement predictable travel patterns into their plan improvements.



Daytime travel corridors require a higher stem density & corridors lower-level side cover for security and safety.

Creating pinch-points that connect to travel and skirt the edges of bedding areas can be very effective.
